On Thursday, May 8, 2024, North Alabama experienced Tornadoes touching down affecting multiple communities across Limestone, Madison, Jackson and DeKalb County Alabama from the five points area of south Huntsville, Gurley to Henagar and surrounding areas confirmed by the National Weather Service. The tornado that touched down in the Henagar area was an EF-2 between County Road 425 and 322 at 10:54 p.m. three miles southeast of Pisgah. The tornado path stretched 10.22 miles long and 880 yards wide. Wind speeds peaked at 135 mph. The tornado ended at 11:20 p.m. three miles northwest of Hammondville in DeKalb County. There were several injuries, but no fatalities reported. MD-34A Lions were alerted and 2VDG Patrick and Lion Josh from Scottsboro Lions prepositioned MD-34A disaster trailer at Henagar County Park Friday in preparation for Rainsville Lions led by Club President Blake Chandler to hand out needed clean-up supplies including gloves, rakes, brooms and mops. Although the Henagar tornado did not meet LCIF Emergency grant criteria, we were able to use what we had onhand to assist the community, said DGE Renié after her site visit to Henagar. Rainsville Club President Blake Chandler shared that having the Response trailer on the ground increased Lions visibility in the community and several inquiries for membership.
